Yeshivah Simchas Chaim Holds Gathering in Flatbush

On Thursday evening, 17 Elul/August 26, a special gathering was held at the home of Assemblyman and Mrs. Dow Hikind in Flatbush on behalf of Yeshivah Simchas Chaim.

The yeshivah, which is beginning its second year, b'ezras Hashem, is a unique one that seeks to provide a fulfilling Torah environment for its talmidim by fostering opportunities for individualized expression and creativity, with an emphasis on personal growth rather than testable academic attainments. Currently, the veshivah has a select group of 15-20 eleventhand twelfth-grade young men who have struggled in mainstream institutions and who may be classified as "at-risk" but remain productive, positive and interested in finding meaning and fulfillment in Yiddishkeit and Torah learning. The talmidim hail from various backgrounds across the spectrum of the Torah community.

The yeshivah's rebbeim and teachers are chosen for their ability to reach out to their young charges and transmit the learning in a manner that is engaging and reflects allegiance to mesonah, and also serve as role models for the talmidim to emulate. There are shiurin on Geman, Hashkafah, Halachah, Chumash and other topics, presented in a manner that the talmidim can relate to, and aimed at counteracting any negative learning experiences they may have had in the past.

Since the yeshivah believes that the most effective way for each talmid to maximize his potential is to do so with an accent on each one's individual needs and style, the yeshivah's approach is to educate rather than to preach, and to inspire rather than to demand.

Rabbi Elchonon Schwartz, the yeshivah's Menahel, noted that, beyond the actual learning, the kesher the rebbeim forge with students is of equal if not greater significance, and makes the greatest impact, both long-term and short-term, in inspiring them in growth in ruchnings. The yeshivah's rebbeim, who all invest incredible kochos handjesh in inspiring their talmidim, view their tafkid as one not restricted to the classroom and are available to provide direction and answer questions. The secular studies component of the yeshivah offers a choice of programs for students, depending on their capabilities and interest, including the New York State Regents Diploma, Penn Foster High School Diploma, GED program and Pre-GED programs. An Individualized Learning Plan (ILP) is set up for each student, in which personalized learning strategies are mapped out, designed to enable each to taste accomplishment, for, as General Studies principal Mr. Reuven Kamin says, "Accomplishment breeds success," which allows the bachurim to build future successes upon previous ones.

There are extracurricular activities and chessed projects to supplement the

limudim. For example, prior to last Sukkos, bachurim from the yeshivah volunteered to erect sukkos for those unable to, as well as for the Masbia soup kitchen.

The staff includes fully-trained therapists who are available to discuss with students any issues or questions that they have. Mr. Yoni Hikind, LMSW, clinical director, stresses that this feature reflects the yeshivah's approach towards chimuch, which is to strive to understand each talmid's essence and needs, in order to facilitate his growth in the best possible way in all areas.

In conversation with Hamodia, Mr. Yisroel Tabi, who devotedly serves as the yeshivah's administrator, underscored how he and the other staff members see their work with the bachurim of the yeshivah as an honor and privilege.

Members of the hanhalah consult with Gedolim and Rabbanim such as Harav Shmuel Kamenetsky, shitia, Rosh Yeshivah, Yeshivah Gedolah of Philadelphia, and Harav Moshe Weinberger, shitia, Rav of Kehillas Aish Kodesh of Woodmere, regarding issues that arise in the course of their avoids hakodesh.

The speakers at the event were Assemblyman Hikind (who gives lectures at the yeshivah), Rabbi Schwartz, Mr. Yoni Hikind and Mrs. Shani Hikind.
