

Community Support Still Urgently Needed for OUR PLACE™ to Survive!

The Jewish Community has been extremely generous in their support of Our Place over the last few months and we want to express a most heartfelt thank you to our growing list of supporters. We are able to continue doing our best to keep Jewish teenagers safe, off the streets, and in rehab, only because of your generosity. No words can express our appreciaton,



Avi Fishof, who has assumed the mantle of leadership, has been working tirelessly to raise the funds needed to sustain this network of teenage drop-in centers in its current emergency situation. Avi, together with his wife Zisi, hosted an emergency Melave Malka/parlor meeting at his home in Flatbush with hundreds of community activists, lay leaders, Rabbonim, and politicians in attendance. Another parlor meeting took place at the home of Dr. Ari Walfish in Queens; coordinated by Mr. Moshe Engel, because their caring community was moved to take action when they learned of our plight. Many prominent Rabbonim and askonim were also present at that meeting and the response at both meetings was overwhelming. Mr. Fishof's fiery speeches at these meetings, and at the appeals he made in the community shuls, called on all of us to act and really moved the crowd. The appeals culminated in an outpouring of generosity that proves "mi k'amcha Yisrael." There is no nation like Am Yisrael whose hearts bleed for a fellow Jew in distress. The way so many of you show your caring by continually giving tzedakah in these economic times, is truly heartwarming.

The financial status of this community service organization has changed drastically in the last year. Government funding was abruptly slashed, and we suddenly find ourselves in the precarious position of having to raise over a million dollars in private funds to account for the shortfall. So far, all our efforts to secure a new government grant under the 'member items' statute have fallen on deaf ears. This is a foolhardy strategy because, as the saying goes, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." The teenagers we service who are using and abusing illegal drugs and/or alcohol are heading down a treacherous path and are in dire need of intervention. For these individuals Our Place is heaven-sent. There are hot kosher dinners, fun activities, a group of friends, and empathetic professional staff members available to the many boys for whom Our Place is a second, or in some cases only, home.

Sadly, Our Place and its affiliates may still be unable to remain operational if our budget needs are not met. There is no doubt



about the need for this kind of organization to be available for the huge number of kids at risk of falling between the cracks. In addition to our boys drop-incenter we run Our Place II (for girls), The Living Room for ongoing treatment and meetings for those struggling with addiction, and Yeshiva Simchas Chaim for boys who need a more personal approach. The dedi-

cation of our Program Directors, Chaim Glantz and Sony Perlman, is unparalleled. The way they managed to keep Our Place running as usual in the midst of a blizzard that strangled New York City is just one example of their devotion. They know from first-hand experience that if the boys do not have therapists available to assist them at the right time it would be disastrous on so many levels. This is what could happen if we are not able to pay them due to the budget shortfall. The boys would then be on the streets without help for their addiction, and exacerbating the problem in our community by introducing other boys into the same disastrous lifestyle.

Aside from the more familiar scenario of teenagers who rebel or who cannot do well in school, the need for a safe haven is a far more serious matter for a whole other subset of our population. For more boys than you can imagine, their own homes are a terrible environment of abuse or neglect in which there is little chance for them to thrive, and they would have nowhere to turn if not for Our Place. The reality of these teenagers' lives is one we would not wish on our worst enemy. Unfortunately it can be a quicker transition than you might think, from troubled teenager to addict. Obtaining and using illegal drugs today is nearly as common and accepted, in certain elements of society, as smoking cigarettes used to be. In the larger American society it is almost a rite of passage to have "experimented" with drugs as a teenager. Not so by us. Therefore the danger of misuse and abuse is even greater, and the risk of our teenagers subsequently overdosing and dying is a horrifying reality that those in this line of work have been forced to face.

Anyone who has attended these levayahs, and witnessed these tragic burials, is driven to do their utmost for the cause. Donations to Our Place, your donation, of any amount you can give, are necessary to literally save the lives of these precious *ne*shamos in Klal Yisroel. In the zechus of the efforts to rescue these yiddishe neshamos and allow them to reach their potential, may Hashem bentch us all with true nachas from our children.
